Insights from psychoanalysis shaped European and North American ideas about the colonial world and the character and potential of native cultures. Psychoanalytic discourse, from Freud's description of female sexuality as a "dark continent" to his conceptualization of primitive societies and the origins of civilization, became inextricable from the ideologies underlying European expansionism.

But as it was adapted in the colonies and then the postcolonies, psychoanalysis proved surprisingly useful for theorizing anticolonialism and postcolonial trauma. Our understandings of culture, citizenship, and self have a history that is colonial and psychoanalytic, but, until now, this intersection has scarcely been explored, much less examined in comparative perspective. Taking on that project, *Unconscious Dominions* assembles essays based on research in Australia, Brazil, France, Haiti, and Indonesia, as well as India, North Africa, and West Africa. John H. Hanson's pathbreaking study revises late-nineteenth-century colonialist

assumptions about a West African Muslim social movement. Using indigenous Arabic manuscripts, travel narratives, and oral materials, Hanson assesses the meaning of a series of revolts against Islamic authority. The book investigates three political crises that took place at Niuro, a town in the region of Karta in the upper Senegal River valley, conquered during a military jihad or "holy war" by Shaykh Umar Tal. Although Umar and his successors steadfastly promoted jihad, Futanke colonists, defying their leaders, opted to remain settled on the lands they had seized; instead of going to war, the colonists devoted themselves to production of foodstuffs for sale in an increasingly vital regional economy. Incisive analysis of charismatic authority and its limits, as demonstrated by Umar and his son Amadu Sheku, illuminates patterns in the unfolding relations between leaders and followers.

Mara learns to move on and a few years later, she marries. He leaves her. Sometime after Mara's husband divorces her, she is called for testing. Her friend places her in a dark room, blindfolded. She is asked to try to identify the person in a room next to her. She finally realizes that the person on the other side of the glass is her long lost love, a POW that has been found and returned to the United

States.

Like many indigenous groups that have endured centuries of subordination, the Berber/Amazigh peoples of North Africa are demanding linguistic and cultural recognition and the redressing of injustices. Indeed, the movement seeks nothing less than a refashioning of the identity of North African states, a rewriting of their history, and a fundamental change in the basis of collective life. In so doing, it poses a challenge to the existing political and sociocultural orders in Morocco and Algeria, while serving as an important counterpoint to the oppositionist Islamist current. This is the first book-length study to analyze the rise of the modern ethnocultural Berber/Amazigh movement in North Africa and the Berber diaspora. Bruce Maddy-Weitzman begins by tracing North African history from the perspective of its indigenous Berber inhabitants and their interactions with more powerful societies, from Hellenic and Roman times, through a millennium of Islam, to the era of Western

colonialism. He then concentrates on the marginalization and eventual reemergence of the Berber question in independent Algeria and Morocco, against a background of the growing crisis of regime legitimacy in each country. His investigation illuminates many issues, including the fashioning of official national narratives and policies aimed at subordinating Berbers in an Arab nationalist and Islamic-centered universe; the emergence of a counter-movement promoting an expansive Berber "imagining" that emphasizes the rights of minority groups and indigenous peoples; and the international aspects of modern Berberism.

Cependant cette période de l'occupation italienne est travaillée par les contradictions. D'une part les Allemands exigent leur part de main-d'œuvre haut-savoyarde pour l'industrie nazie et ils font mettre en place le S.T.O. de sinistre mémoire, d'autre part le Régime de Vichy se durcit considérablement sous la houlette de Pierre Laval avec la création de la Milice française par Joseph Darnand et tente d'enrôler un grand

nombre de Hauts-Savoyards sous sa bannière (voir l'affaire Bernard de Menthon dans le tome I de cette série intitulée La nuit sera longue). Or ce double mouvement constitue un important levier pour la Résistance qui recrute les jeunes réfractaires à tour de bras. Des Dents de Lanfon, au-dessus d'Annecy, jusqu'au Mont-Blanc, les montagnes de Haute-Savoie se couvrent de maquis et commencent à esquisser pour la France et le monde les contours harmonieux de la figure de l'Espérance et de la Résurrection.
