In Trauma, Culture, and Metaphor, John Wilson and Jacob Lindy explore the language of both individual and collective trauma in an era dominated by

globalization and interconnectedness. Through lucid, careful discussion, this important book builds a bridge between the etymology of trauma-related terms commonly used in Western cultures and those of other cultures, such as the Burundi-Rwandan *ihahamuka*. It also provides the clinician with a framework for working with trauma survivors using a cross-cultural vocabulary—one often based in metaphor—to fully address the experienced trauma and to begin work on reconnection and self-reinvention.

*Four Plays. (The Year of Pilár; A World Elsewhere; The Cream in the Well; Dark Encounter.)*. Tor Books

In this collection of new poems, William Hollis collaborates with fine-art photographer Andrea Baldeck, his wife and his companion in their creative encounters with time, friendship, the tricks of memory, heroes from the past (Keats and Rilke, Liszt and Brahms, Martin Buber and Buddha), and, most of all, with the power of language. While Hollis and Baldeck work independently, the poems and pictures share an emotional unity that heightens the expression of both mediums, and the darkness of his intelligence is relieved by the wit of her vision. Hollis's work confronts an angry world that whirs out of focus. The past--"a childhood reading National Geographic, / skinny legs dangling over the arm of a chair"--merges with a future that seems increasingly irrelevant, and a television screen broadcasting the colors of war blurs into ancient tablets that merely hint at truth. Moving from the savannahs of central Florida to ancient Chinese villages along the Silk Road, the poems trace a journey peering through doorways, finding refuge in music, comfort in potato and leek soup, and excitement in a dangerous addiction to books. Aware of swollen knuckles, arthritic fingers, and the fragility of age, the poet is restored by language. Whether words "stumble / over their own intractability or leap briefly / like an awkward egret," or "blend into a soft stirring of pines," they become his armor in the fight against isolation and destruction. Writing against the riptide that pulls him toward despair, Hollis survives by yielding to the artistic process, a countercurrent that delivers him to the safe touch of a woman's hand and to the sanity of birds chatting in the afternoon. Baldeck's penetrating black-and-white pictures refract the poet himself and readers discover him embellished with foliage, faintly suggested in a smoky mirror, and distorted on both sides of a fish-eye lens. With *Dark Encounter* in Mid Air, an intimate and mature partnership, Hollis and Baldeck create images in two art forms that allow readers to experience a lifetime "rich with anticipation." William Hollis, poet, retired teacher, and philanthropist, serves on the boards of the Philadelphia Museum of Art and the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society. He is a benefactor of the Kimmel Center, Inc., a charitable, not-for-profit organization that maintains the Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts, which operates the Philadelphia Orchestra and its Academy of Music. Andrea Baldeck is a fine-art photographer whose work has appeared in exhibits at the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, Washington and Lee University, and the Gallery Holly Snapp in Venice, Italy. Her first book of photographs, *The Heart of Haiti*, grew out of her work as a volunteer physician at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital in Haiti; other books include *Talismanic* and *Touching the Mekong*. She serves on the boards of several institutions, including Vassar College and the Settlement Music School in Philadelphia, the largest community-based school of the arts in the United States.

*Reading Ji Kang's Essays* Star Key Press

This is the first English-language book on the philosophy of Ji Kang. Moreover, it offers the first systematic treatment of his philosophy, thus filling a significant gap in English-language scholarship on early medieval Chinese literature and philosophy. David Chai brings to light Ji Kang's Neo-Daoist heritage and explores the themes in his writings that were derived from classical Daoism, most notably the need for humanity to return to a more harmonious co-existence with Nature to further our own self-understanding. His analysis is unique in that it balances translation and annotation with expositing the creative philosophizing of Neo-Daoism. The identities of Jacob and his assailant have long presented an exegetical quandary for interpreters examining the encounter at the Jabbok.

Characterizing Elohim/ish is particularly complex, as evidenced by the sheer number of possibilities offered by scholars--a river demon, a specter of Esau, Yahweh in disguise, and even Jacob's own psyche. Moreover, Jacob himself is plagued by his dual nomenclature and by an ambivalent relationship to the land he has been promised. In this dissertation, I argue that the ambiguous identities of this story's characters are strategic in that they create a permeable narrative space for the anxieties and desires of the exilic and post-exilic community to find voice. A number of metaphors/images in the text--name, face, wound, darkness, and crossing--allow the community producing the story narrative places to wrestle with their origins, their relationship to proximate others, and to God. At the Jabbok, Jacob says his name, inquires about his assailant's name, and is renamed (Gen.32:27-29). The polynomialism of Elohim/ish, as well as the place label, Peniel, obscures his identity, as does his refusal to disclose his name. When Jacob wrestles with his opponent, he claims to have seen God "face to face," yet this figure is cloaked in darkness (Gen.32:30; cf. 33:10). Jacob also sustains an invisible wound at the hand of this invisible opponent (Gen.32:25, 31-32). At the Jabbok, Jacob is in darkness (Gen.32:22-24), and examination of the larger narrative reveals that it is in darkness where Jacob frequently deceives others, is himself deceived, or encounters God (Gen. 27:1-29; 28:10; 29:21-30). Finally, the metaphor of the crossing (Gen.32:23) symbolizes Jacob's exile and return from home. Each of these metaphors/images contributes to the identity of the exilic/post-exilic community by constructing a story that depicts its ambivalent relationship to itself, to others, and to God. Therefore, this story is no casual, disinterested recollection of a shared past. Rather, it is a highly charged textual space where the communal memory of wounded storytellers is recalled.
